Japan Knowledge Lib" feature

In April, the number of simultaneous connections to "Japan Knowledge Lib" became **unlimited**. Therefore, we would like to introduce "Japan Knowledge Lib" in this issue.

What is "Japan Knowledge Lib"?

This is a comprehensive full-text database of dictionaries and encyclopedias in Japan. The database contains over 70 dictionaries and encyclopedias, including the "Nihon Dai Hyakka Zensho", "Nihon Kokugo Daijiten", and the Dictionary of the Japanese Language, and dictionaries in English, German, French, Spanish, Italian, Romanian and more. You can search more than 70 contents at once.

Reading and full-text search available

"Japan Knowledge Lib" includes not only dictionaries and encyclopedias, but also complete works, paperbacks, and magazines, so you can enjoy reading.

These can also be searched in full text, which is useful when looking up how a particular word is used or how often it appears.

You can read this and that!

• **Toyo Bunko**(東洋文庫): A large collection of classics and famous books in various fields across Asia. 858 volumes, full-text searchable.

・Bungeishunju Archives (文藝春秋アーカイブズ) : You can use a collection of 323 volumes of Bungeishunju, a general monthly magazine founded by the writer Kikuchi Kan (菊池寬), from the first issue in January 1923 to the December 1950 issue (excluding extra issues).

· Zinbutsu Sousho (人物叢書): Includes 270 volumes of the Biographies of Japanese History series. etc.


These magazine collections can be searched for articles by item or keyword in the magazine article index database (Web OYA-bunko).

This Month's Antique Book

<u>Kana-mozi-dzukai(仮名文字遣)</u>



Kana-mozi-dzukai(大国1050)

Location : Central Library Valuable Materials Collection

Have you ever experienced confusion when reading ancient Japanese texts, such as "&aigeta (nao)", " $\underline{a}o\underline{b}o$ (<u>ono-ono</u>)," and " $\underline{b} <$ (<u>oku</u>)," because they are written differently even though they sound the same? In fact, people in those days had similar problems.

"Kana-moji-dzukai" (written by Gyoa) is a book that stipulated which words should be written in which kana script during the Nanbokucho period (1336-1392). It is also called "Teika Kana-dzukai (定家仮名遣)" because of its association with "Teika Fujiwara (藤原定家)" preface.
